At the end of the night when he saw her again (mind you there were over 900 people in attendance) he looked at her and said, "the first kosher member of the legislature" remembering exactly who she was. Elaine got a kick out of that and described him as a "super genius." It so happens that Elaine is featured spotlight woman this month. She is a formidable and remarkable force of nature. Campaign Update

We are happy to report the following:

- The 2022 General Campaign has raised \$24.3 million from more than 6,500 donors with a card-for-card increase of 12.93 percent.
- The Women's Campaign has raised \$7.4 million from more than 3,400 donors with a card-for-card increase of 13.29 percent.
- The 2023 General Campaign has raised \$8.4 million from more than 2,000 donors with a card-for-card increase of 8.51 percent.
- The Women's Campaign has raised \$3.7 million from more than 1,200 donors with a card-for-card increase of 20.44 percent.

Women of Wisdom Learning Series

In the second of the learning series examining powerful women in our tradition, Rabbi Laila Hass invited the participants to look at Queen Esther, the heroine of the *Purim* story, with fresh eyes, since most of us only know the story from our childhood. Through art renderings and a close reading of part of the ancient biblical text, a richer, deeper narrative was revealed. As layers of meaning were gradually uncovered, Esther's hidden story came alive in a vibrant and unexpected way, offering a fascinating encounter with the queen and Mordechai we thought we knew, but rediscovered.

Experiences to Live Our Values

Young moms gathered at the Miami Beach JCC to get a closer look at the impact of Federation. They heard from a few of our local agencies and learned what is happening in the world of Jewish education from Rabbi Efrat Zarren-Zohar, executive director of CAJE and Amanda Burns, director of the PJ library. They also toured the Miami Beach JCC with Karen Sepsenwol, Development Director of the Miami Beach JCC. In addition, they participated in a mitzvah project from the Jewish Volunteer Center and packaged *Mishloach Manot* (Purim treats) for families in need to be distributed by the JCS Kosher Food Bank. The group enjoyed connecting, meeting each other, being inspired and informed about Federation's role in our community.

Spotlight on Elaine Bloom



How did you become involved with Federation?

My late husband (Phillip) and I moved to Miami in 1962 from Riverdale in New York City after much coaxing by our dearest friends. Philip had been hired by the law firm of Myers, Heiman & Kaplan (as in Stanley Myers, first President of the Greater Miami Jewish Federation) so we were immediately "involved." By 1965, the Women's Division as it was known then, decided to create a "No Minimum Division Luncheon" held at the Dupont Plaza Hotel. I was asked to bring a few people and I literally knocked on doors of young women I barely knew. With about 6 or 7 tables, I was treated as a "leader" and seated at the dais (I was 27 at the time)! Shortly after that, leaders of the "Women's Division," created a

"Young Women's Division" and I was involved in developing it further. At the same time, I was moving up the ranks of the Greater Miami Section of National Council of Jewish Women (NCJW), becoming Section President and serving on the National Board. That is how I became so involved in the issues of state legislation - which ultimately led to my service in the Florida House of Representatives (as only the 16th woman ever sworn into that body).

Why is your involvement important to you?

My involvement in the GMJF has been very important to me for well over 55 years. In 1972, I was privileged to be recognized by Federation as a Young Leadership awardee (now called the Stanley C. Myers award). It was a natural fulfillment of my family background! I grew up in a "Conserva-dox" Jewish home. My mother (who spoke 5 languages when she arrived in the US in 1922 at the age of 15) was a Hadassah leader and President, a Sisterhood leader and a League of Women Voters leader. So much for being a stay-at-home mom. She was also involved with NY City's Federation of Jewish Philanthropies. My parents were ardent Zionists - and support for Israel was of major concern for both. My father (a jeweler and watchmaker who arrived in the US at 17 in1920) was an active Labor Zionist. Dinner-time conversation involved my brother and me in daily discussion of things Israel and political. My father read the Yiddish newspaper "Der Tag" (the Day) and the NY Times every day. We knew what was really happening in the world!

What is a philanthropic accomplishment of yours that you are most proud of?

It's been my privilege to serve as a lay leader in many wonderful Jewish community organizations (mostly local with a few national leadership roles as well). I've also worked professionally at the state and national level for several wonderful Jewish organizations. I've been a donor at a leadership level in many of these organizations - the following stands out as I look back:

- Becoming a Forever Lion of Judah!
- Putting my parents' names on an office in Bar Ilan University's Law School in Israel
- Being a Life Member of NCJW and several other major Jewish organizations Putting up plagues in the Jewish Museum of Florida and in Temple EmanuEl in memory of my
- beloved husband Philip and in honor of my children Anne and David.


What is something that no one knows about vou?

Did You Know???

Federation is always ready to respond.

Your donation to the Greater Miami Jewish Federation Turkey-Syria Earthquakes Emergency Fund goes directly to emergency response organizations, which are on the ground providing humanitarian aid. Cadena, an international, disaster-response nonprofit and Federation partner, is using its Life Locator, a tool that can track signs of life in disaster situations. They are working closely with Israel Defense Forces Home Front Command. Our overseas partner, the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee (JDC) responded within hours of the earthquakes and has been distributing ready-to-eat meals, blankets and thermal



clothing, heated tents and first aid kits, and is working with the Turkish Embassy to deliver medical supplies to hospitals severely damaged by the disaster that are continuing to treat survivors. In addition to Cadena and JDC, there has been a significant response by Israeli organizations including IsraAID, United Hatzalah, Magen David Adom and Natan.
